GAME COMMISSION POSTS  
BEAR AGE DATA ON WEBSITE

Harrisburg - Hunters interested in learning the age of the bear they harvested during the 2009 seasons can log onto the Pennsylvania Game Commission's website ([www.pgc.state.pa.us](http://www.pgc.state.pa.us)). To access the database, click on "Hunt/Trap" in the menu bar at the top of the page, click on "Hunting," scroll down and click on "Black Bear" in the "Big Game" listing, and then scroll down and click on "Black Bear Age Data" in the "Reference" listing.

"As a cost-cutting measure, the Game Commission no longer mails a certificate and letter to successful bear hunters notifying them of their bear's age," said Carl G. Roe, agency executive director. "To maintain this valued customer service, however, we provide hunters with a certificate at the check station when their bear is processed, and information about how and when they can find the age data, which is determined by examining a tooth from the bear that is extracted as part of the check station processing, on our website."

Ages are available only for bears from which a tooth was pulled. To access the data and learn the age of their bear, a hunter will need to have their legal seal number from the check station certificate. If the hunter no longer has the seal number, age data also is provided in charts broken down by county of harvest.

In 2009, of the nearly 148,000 licensed bear hunters, 3,512 bears were harvested and taken to check stations, which is the second highest harvest recorded in Pennsylvania. The record bear harvest of 4,164 was set in 2005.

Instructions on the back of the certificates distributed at check stations to access this data on the agency's website presently is incorrect. The certificates issued in 2009 were printed and distributed prior to the agency's transition to a new website format, which has significantly changed the navigation features of the new website. fb

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



## FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

### Dear Community Members:

As August draws to a close, September's promise of a fresh beginning is just ahead. "Back to School" has special meanings for each of us, whether we are students (former or current), educators, or parents. At Bolivar-Richburg, the start of a new school year represents the renewal of our commitment to helping our children develop their potential and achieve their dreams. We know that learning is the key to success, and learning will be our focus as we strive to provide the best education possible for all of our students.

One of the ways in which we assess student learning is through the New York State tests in English Language Arts and Math, administered each year in Grades 3 through 8. As you may be aware, in late July the New York State Education Department released the scores for the tests given in the spring of 2010. Prior to the release of the results, the Commissioner announced that there would be a change in the "cut scores" which are used to define the levels of student performance on these tests, scored from Levels 1 to 4. Because of this change, it was predicted that districts could expect to see a decline in the number of students who scored at Levels 3 and 4 (meeting or exceeding proficiency standards). For example, in 2009, a student scoring 650 on the 3rd Grade Math test would have achieved a Level 3. In 2010, a score of 684 was required to earn a Level 3. Our scores are listed in the chart below. While the percentage of students scoring at Levels 3 and 4 is lower than last year, it is important for us to realize that it does not translate into a decline of student achievement or performance. It means that the state has decided to score the exams more rigorously, in an effort to make "proficiency" more meaningful and indicative of future success than it had been in the past. As a District, we will examine and analyze this data and work hard to enhance our curriculum and instruction to help all our students achieve to their highest potential.

The start of another school year is just around the corner, and I hope that the students, faculty, and staff are gearing up for what I am sure will be another great year at our elementary school.

We have not had major renovations taking place at the elementary building this summer, so our custodial staff, grounds crew, and summer help have been able to thoroughly clean the building and get the outside of the building looking great for the start of school. If you bring your child to school late or need to get them out of school early, you **must** sign them in or out in the guidance office. Your child must

### be in school by 8:10 in order to not be marked tardy.

Continuing with our bus policy of last year, there will be no bus passes issued for students to ride a different bus home or be dropped off at a different location. If you have not filled out the form designating your child's pick up and drop off point, please do so by contacting our bus transportation supervisor at the bus garage.

Students may purchase breakfast and/or lunch by using their student ID card. It is extremely important that your child has money on their cafeteria account. If a student does not have money on their account, they will not be able to purchase the menu meal.

"**Meet the Teacher Night**" is scheduled for September 16th from 6:30 – 8:00 for all first through fifth grade classrooms. **Picture Day** is scheduled for September 21st for all students.

**INFORMATION REGARDING NON-DISCRIMINATION**

The Bolivar-Richburg Central School District does not discriminate on the basis of sex, sexual orientation, age, marital status, military status, political affiliation, race, creed or religion, color, national origin, or disability in the employment and educational opportunities it offers, including career and technical educational opportunities as required by Title IX of the 1972 Educational Amendments and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

**Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973**

The Board of Education affirms its compliance with those sections of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 dealing with program accessibility.

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act prohibits discrimination against qualified individuals with disabilities in federally assisted programs or activities solely on the basis of disability. The District shall make its program and facilities accessible to all its students with disabilities.

The District shall also identify, evaluate and extend to every qualified student with a disability under Section 504 a free, appropriate public education, including modifications, accommodations, specialized instruction or related aids and services, as deemed necessary to meet their educational needs as adequately as the needs of non-disabled students are met.

**Sexual Harassment of Students**

The Board of Education affirms its commitment to non-discrimination and recognizes its responsibility to provide for all District students an environment that is free of sexual harassment and intimidation. Sexual harassment is a violation of law and stands in direct opposition to District policy. Therefore, the Board prohibits and condemns all forms of sexual harassment by employees, school volunteers, students, and non-employees such as contractors and vendors which occur on school grounds and at all school sponsored events, programs and activities including those that take place at locations off school premises or those that take place in another state. Generally, sexual harassment is defined as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors and other verbal or physical conduct or communication of a sexual nature when:

- a) Submission to or rejection of such sexually harassing conduct and/or communication by a student affects decisions regarding any aspect of the student's education, including participation in school-sponsored activities;
- b) Conditions exist within the school environment that allow or foster obscene pictures, lewd jokes, sexual advances, requests for sexual favors or other harassing activities of a sexual nature; and
- c) Such conduct and/or communication has the purpose or effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with a student's academic performance or participation in an educational or extracurricular activity, or creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive learning environment; and/or effectively bars the student's access to an educational opportunity or benefit.

**Complaint Process**

Any student suspecting discrimination on the basis of sex, sexual orientation, age, marital status, military status, political affiliation, race, creed or religion, color, national origin, or disability may make a claim of discrimination using the procedure outlined below. Anyone who is aware of or has a complaint about sexual harassment should also follow this procedure. This claim or complaint is filed with the Superintendent/designee, who will assist with the complaint process if necessary. The following information should be included on the complaint.

- 1) The exact nature of the complaint – actions, policies, or practices believed to be discriminatory and any person believed to be responsible.
- 2) The date, time and place of the alleged discriminatory action(s).
- 3) The names of witnesses or persons who have knowledge about the complaint.
- 4) Any available written documentation or evidence that is relevant to the complaint.
- 5) The actions that could be taken to correct the complaint.

The Superintendent/designee shall cause a review of the complaint to be conducted (including necessary meetings and interviews) and a written response mailed to the complainant within ten school days after receipt of the complaint.

If it is agreed that discrimination occurred, corrective action will be taken to restore denied rights.

If there is not agreement, a written appeal may be submitted to the Board of Education indicating the reasons for disagreement. The Board of Education shall consider the appeal at its next regularly scheduled meeting following receipt of the appeal.

A complaint of illegal discrimination may also be filed with the Federal Office for Civil Rights, United States Department of Education.

**FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA) MODEL NOTICE FOR DIRECTORY INFORMATION**

The *Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act* (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that Bolivar-Richburg Central School, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, Bolivar-Richburg Central School may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the Bolivar-Richburg Central School District to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- A playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- The annual yearbook;
- Honor roll or other recognition lists;
- Graduation programs; and
- Sports activity sheets, such as for wrestling, showing weight and height of team members.

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistance under the *Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965* (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories – names, addresses and telephone listings – unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.

If you do not want Bolivar-Richburg Central School to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing by September 30, 2010. Bolivar-Richburg Central School has designated the following information as directory information:

- Student's name
- Address
- Telephone listing
- Electronic mail address
- Photograph
- Date and place of birth
- Major field of study
- Dates of attendance
- Grade level
- Participation of officially recognized activities and sports
- Weight and height of members of athletic teams
- Degrees, honor, and awards received
- The most recent educational agency or institution attended
- Student ID number, user ID, or other unique personal identifier used to communicate in electronic systems that cannot be used to access education records without a PIN, password, etc. (A student's SSN, in whole or in part, cannot be used for this purpose.)

These laws are: Section 9528 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (20 U.S.C. § 7908), as amended, and 10 U.S.C. § 503(c), as amended.

**MODEL NOTIFICATION OF RIGHTS UNDER FERPA FOR ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS**

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. These rights are:

(1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day Bolivar-Richburg Central School receives a request for access.

Parents or eligible students should submit to the Bolivar-Richburg Central School appropriate building principal a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The school official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

(2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights under FERPA.

Parents or eligible students who wish to ask the school to amend a record should write the appropriate school building principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it should be changed. If Bolivar-Richburg Central School decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the school will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

(3) The right to privacy of personally identifiable information in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the school as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the school has outsourced services or functions it would otherwise use its own employees to perform (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee; or a parent, student, or other volunteer assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

Upon request, Bolivar-Richburg Central School discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll, or is already enrolled if the disclosure is for purposes of the student's enrollment or transfer.

(4) The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the School to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are:

**SUMMARY CODE OF CONDUCT**

(Edited Version)

Bolivar-Richburg Secondary School  
2010-2011**Any Willful act, which disrupts the educational process, is prohibited.****Definitions**

For purposes of this code, the following definitions apply.

**Disruptive student** – An elementary or secondary student under the age of 21 who is substantially disruptive of the educational process or substantially interferes with the teacher's authority over the classroom.**Parent** – Parent, guardian, or person in parental relation to a student.**School Property** - In or within any building, structure, athletic playing field, playground, parking lot, or land contained within the real property boundary line of a public elementary or secondary school, or in or on a school bus, as defined in Vehicle and Traffic Law §142.**School Function** – Any school-sponsored extra-curricular event or activity regardless of location.**Violent Student** – Student under the age of 21 who:

1. Commits an act of violence upon a school employee, or attempts to do so.
2. Commits, while on school property or at a school function, an act of violence upon another student or any other person lawfully on school property or at the school function, or attempts to do so.
3. Possesses, while on school property or at a school function, a weapon.
4. Displays, while on school property or at a school function, what appears to be a weapon.
5. Threatens, while on school property or at a school function, to use a weapon. Knowingly and intentionally damages or destroys the personal property of any school employee or any person lawfully on school property or at a school function.
6. Knowingly and intentionally damages or destroys school district property.

**Weapon** – A firearm as defined in 18 USC §921 for purposes of the Gun-Free Schools Act. It also means any other gun, BB gun, pistol, revolver, shotgun, rifle, machine gun, disguised gun, dagger, dirk, razor, stiletto, switchblade knife, gravity knife, brass knuckles, sling shot, metal knuckle knife, box cutter, cane sword, electronic dart gun, Kung Fu star, electronic stun gun, pepper spray or other noxious spray, explosive or incendiary bomb, other device, instrument, material or substance that can cause physical injury or death when used to cause physical injury or death.**Student Dress Code**

All students are expected to give proper attention to personal cleanliness and to dress appropriately for school and school functions. Students and their parents have the primary responsibility for acceptable student dress and appearance. Teachers and all other district personnel should exemplify and reinforce acceptable student dress and help students develop an understanding of appropriate appearance in the school setting.

A student's dress, grooming, and appearance, including hair style/color, jewelry, make-up and nails:

1. Shall be safe, appropriate, and not disrupt or interfere with the educational process.
2. Shall recognize that extremely brief garments, such as tube tops, net tops, halter tops, spaghetti straps, plunging necklines (front and/or back), extremely short skirts and shorts (must go beyond mid-thigh) and see-through garments are prohibited. Shoulder straps must be at least 2 inches wide. No midriffs will be showing. Tops must cover the midriff area, sitting or standing (the navel and back must be covered). Gentleman should not wear muscle shirts that do not cover the entire shoulder area or with cuts down the side.
3. Shall ensure that under apparel is completely covered with outer clothing. No open fly, see through tights or pajama bottoms are allowed.
4. Shall include footwear at all times. Slippers are not allowed. Footwear that is a safety hazard will not be allowed.
5. Shall exclude wearing hats, caps, or other head coverings in school or in the classrooms. This includes no wearing of the hood of a sweatshirt. Head bands which are distracting in nature are not permitted.
6. Shall not include items that are vulgar, obscene, libelous, or denigrate others on account of race, color, religion, creed, national origin, sexual orientation, or disability.
7. Shall not promote and/or endorse the use of alcohol, tobacco or illegal drugs and/or encourage other illegal or violent activities.
8. Shall not include wallet chains, spike jewelry and other heavy chains because of the potential safety hazard and because they are disruptive in class and can damage school property.
9. Shall not wear clothing (including clothing with writing) or have appearance which will tend to be upsetting to other persons present on school premises, as determined by teachers or staff of the school.

If the student disagrees with the conclusion of the teacher or staff member, they may seek review by the Principal or Superintendent. If the student is unhappy with the decision of the named Administrators, the student can request a further review by the Board of Education. It is understood that a student who requests a review will still need to change the clothing in question until the review process can take place.

**This code is a guideline and is up to the discretion of the staff to determine appropriateness as needed.** Students who violate the student dress code shall be required to modify their appearance by covering or removing the offending item, if necessary or practical, and replacing it with an acceptable item. The office personnel will provide a t-shirt as needed. Any student who refuses to comply shall be subject to discipline and any student who repeatedly fails to comply with the dress code shall be subject to further discipline, up to and including out of school suspension. Students who cannot modify their appearance as required will be placed in In-School Suspension until appropriate clothing can be secured.**Electronic Devices****All video, audio, cell phones, pagers, MP3 players and other electronic communication devices are prohibited. Students who bring electronic devices to school are to have them turned off and put away until dismissal. Devices should be turned off when the school doors are opened at 7:45 A.M. and cannot be turned back on until after the advisement bell rings at 2:48 P.M. Administrative action will be taken against students who violate this rule. Consequences for this type of violation will result in detention and/or the school administrator/employee confiscating the electronic device. Repeated violations will result in escalating circumstances which could include in-school suspension and temporary confiscation of the electronic device. Devices which are frequently confiscated or cause a major disturbance can be held by the school for an extended period of time.**

Parent and student communication should be kept to a minimum during the school day. In the event of an emergency, parents can contact the school to communicate with their child, or a child can use the phone in the main office to contact a parent. Final decisions on communication are subject to the discretion of the school.

**Prohibited Student Conduct**

The board of education expects all students to conduct themselves in an appropriate and civil manner, with proper regard for the rights and welfare of other students, district personnel and other members of the school community, and for the care of school facilities and equipment.

The best discipline is self-imposed, and students must learn to assume and accept responsibility for their own behavior, as well as the consequences of their misbehavior. District personnel who interact with students are expected to use disciplinary action only when necessary and to place emphasis on the students' ability to grow in self-discipline.

The board recognizes the need to make its expectations for student conduct while on school property or engaged in a school function specific and clear. The rules of conduct listed below are intended to do that and to focus on safety and respect for the rights and property of others. Students who will not accept responsibility for their own behavior and who violate these school rules will be required to accept the penalties for their conduct.

Students may be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including suspension from school, when they:

**A. Engage in conduct that is disorderly.**

Examples of disorderly conduct include, but are not limited to:

1. Running in hallways.
2. Making unreasonable noise.
3. Using language or gestures that are profane, lewd, vulgar, or abusive.
4. Obstructing vehicular or pedestrian traffic, including hallway traffic. Large groups of students cannot gather in front of one locker.
5. Engaging in any willful act which disrupts the normal operation of the school community.
6. Trespassing. Students are not permitted in any school building, other than the one they regularly attend, without permission from the administrator in charge of the building.
7. Computer/electronic communications misuse, including any unauthorized use of computers, software, or internet/intranet account; accessing inappropriate web sites; or any other violation of the district's acceptable use policy.
8. No outwardly displays of affection will be allowed. This includes but is not limited to hand holding, hugging and kissing.
9. Any person to person contact which is deemed inappropriate by school officials is not allowed.

**B. Engage in conduct that is insubordinate.**

Examples of insubordinate conduct include, but are not limited to:

1. Failing to comply with the reasonable directions of teachers, school administrators or other school employees in charge of students or otherwise demonstrating disrespect.
2. Lateness for, missing, or leaving school without permission.
3. Skipping detention.

**C. Engage in conduct that is disruptive.**

Examples of disruptive conduct include, but are not limited to:

1. Failing to comply with the reasonable directions of the teachers, school administrators, or other school personnel in charge of students.

**D. Engage in conduct that is violent.**

Examples of violent conduct include, but are not limited to:

1. Committing an act of violence (such as hitting, kicking, punching, and scratching) upon a teacher, administrator, or other school employee or attempting to do so.
2. Committing an act of violence (such as hitting, kicking, punching, and scratching) upon another student or any other person lawfully on school property or attempting to do so.
3. Possessing a weapon. Authorized law enforcement officials are the only persons permitted to have a weapon in their possession while on school property or at a school function.
4. Displaying what appears to be a weapon.
5. Threatening to use any weapon.
6. Intentionally damaging or destroying the personal property of a student, teacher, administrator, other district employee, or any person lawfully on school property, including graffiti or arson.
7. Intentionally damaging or destroying school district property.

**E. Engage in any conduct that endangers the safety, morals, health, or welfare of others.**

Examples of such conduct include, but are not limited to:

1. Lying to school personnel.
2. Stealing the property of other students, school personnel or any other person lawfully on school property or attending a school function.
3. Defamation, which includes making false or unprivileged statements or representations about an individual or identifiable group of individuals that harm the reputation of the person or the identifiable group by demeaning them.
4. Discrimination, which includes the use of race, color, creed, national origin, religion, gender, sexual orientation, or disability as a basis for treating another in a negative manner.
5. Harassment, which includes a sufficiently severe action or a persistent, pervasive pattern of actions or statements directed at an identifiable individual or group which are intended to be or which a reasonable person would perceive as ridiculing or demeaning.
6. Intimidation, which includes engaging actions or statements that put another individual in fear of bodily harm.
7. Hazing, which includes any intentional or reckless act directed against another for the purpose of initiation into, affiliating with or maintaining membership in any school sponsored activity, organization, club or team.
8. Selling, using, or possessing obscene material.
9. Using vulgar or abusive language, cursing, or swearing.
10. Smoking or possessing a cigarette, cigar, pipe or using chewing or smokeless tobacco.

11. Possessing, consuming, selling, distributing, or exchanging alcoholic beverages or illegal substances, or being under the influence of either. "illegal substances" include, but are not limited to, inhalants, marijuana, cocaine, LSD, PCP, amphetamines, heroin, steroids, look-alike drugs, and any substances commonly referred to as "designer drugs".
12. Inappropriately using or sharing prescription and over-the-counter drugs.
13. Gambling.
14. Indecent exposure, that is, exposure to sight of the private parts of the body in a lewd or indecent manner.
15. Initiating a report warning of fire or other catastrophe without valid cause, misuse of 911, or discharging a fire extinguisher.

**F. Engage in misconduct while on a school bus.**

It is crucial for students to behave appropriately while riding on district buses to ensure their safety and that of other passengers and to avoid distracting the bus driver. Students are required to conduct themselves on the bus in a manner consistent with established standards for classroom behavior as outlined in the school bus riders' manual.

**G. Engage in any form of academic misconduct.**

Examples of academic misconduct include, but are not limited to:

1. Plagiarism
2. Cheating
3. Copying
4. Altering records
5. Assisting another student in any of the above actions.

**Reporting Violations**

All students are expected to promptly report violations of the code of conduct to a teacher, guidance counselor, the building principal or designee. Any student observing a student possessing a weapon, alcohol or illegal substance on school property or at a school function shall report this information immediately to a teacher, the building principal, the principal's designee or the superintendent.

Any weapon, alcohol, or illegal substance found shall be confiscated immediately, if possible, followed by notification to the parent of the student involved and the appropriate disciplinary sanction if warranted, which may include permanent suspension and referral for prosecution.

**Disciplinary Penalties, Procedures & Referrals**

Discipline is most effective when it deals directly with the problem at the time and place it occurs, and in a way that students view as fair and impartial. School personnel who interact with students are expected to use disciplinary action only when necessary and to place emphasis on the students' ability to grow in self-discipline.

Disciplinary action, when necessary, will be firm, fair and consistent so as to be the most effective in changing student behavior. In determining the appropriate disciplinary action, school personnel authorized to impose disciplinary penalties will consider the following:

1. The student's age.
2. The nature of the offense and the circumstances which led to the offense.
3. The student's prior disciplinary record.
4. The effectiveness of other forms of discipline.
5. Information from parents, teachers and/or others, as appropriate.
6. Other extenuating circumstances.

As a general rule, discipline will be progressive. This means that a student's first violation will usually merit a lighter penalty than subsequent violations.

If the conduct of a student is related to a disability or suspected disability, the student shall be referred to the Committee on Special Education and discipline, if warranted, shall be administered consistent with the separate requirements of this code of conduct for disciplining students with a disability or presumed to have a disability.

**Penalties**

Students who are found to have violated the district's code of conduct may be subject to the following penalties, either alone or in combination. Penalties will be imposed by authorized school personnel as designed by School Education Law and consistent with the student's right to due process. Examples of penalties are:

1. Oral warning
2. Written warning
3. Written notification to parent
4. Detention
5. Extended detention
6. Saturday detention
7. Suspension from transportation
8. Suspension from athletic participation
9. Suspension from social or extracurricular activities
10. Suspension of other privileges
11. In-School Suspension
12. Removal from classroom by teacher
13. Short-term (five days or less) suspension from school
14. Long-term (more than five days) suspension from school
15. Permanent suspension from school

**Periods of Suspension****Students who bring weapons to school**

Any student found guilty of bringing a weapon onto school property will be subject to suspension from school for at least one calendar year.

**Students who commit violent acts other than bringing a weapon to school.**

Any student who is found to have committed a violent act, other than bringing a weapon onto school property, shall be subject to suspension from school for at least five days.

**Students who are repeatedly substantially disruptive of the educational process or repeatedly substantially interfere with the teacher's authority over the classroom.**

Any student who repeatedly is substantially disruptive of the educational process or substantially interferes with the teacher's authority over the classroom will be suspended from school for a minimum of two (2) days. For purposes of this code of conduct, "repeatedly is substantially disruptive" means engaging in conduct that results in the student being removed from the classroom by teacher(s) pursuant to Education Law §3214(3-a) and this code on four or more occasions during a semester. If the proposed penalty is the minimum two-day suspension, the student and the student's parent will be given the same notice and opportunity for an informal conference given to all students subject to a short-term suspension. If the proposed penalty exceeds the minimum two-day suspension, the student and the student's parent will be given the same notice and opportunity for a hearing given to all students subject to a long-term suspension. The suspending authority has the authority to modify the minimum five-day suspension on a case-by-case basis. In deciding whether to modify the penalty, the suspending authority may consider the same factors considered in modifying a one-year suspension for possessing a weapon.

**Referrals**

Students may be referred to a counselor, Family Court (PINS) or County Attorney for a juvenile delinquent proceeding as required by law.

**Alternative Instruction**

When a student of any age is removed from class by a teacher or a student of compulsory attendance age is suspended from school pursuant to Education Law §3214, the district will take immediate steps to provide alternative means of instruction for the student.

**Student Lockers, Desks and other School Storage Places**

Students have no reasonable expectation of privacy with respect to these places and school officials retain complete control over them. This means that student lockers, desks and other school storage places may be subject to search at any time by school officials, without prior notice to students and without their consent.

**Student Guidelines****Cafeteria**

The school cafeteria is maintained as a vital part of the health program of the school. To encourage good nutrition, a well-balanced breakfast and lunch are offered at a reasonable price.

The lunchroom management and your fellow students will appreciate your cooperation in:

1. Depositing all lunch litter in wastebaskets.
2. Returning all trays and utensils to the dishwashing area.
3. Leaving the table and floor around your place in a clean condition for others.
4. Once a student is seated they should not make an excessive number of trips from their table.
5. No food or drink may be taken from the cafeteria.

**Students who do not display proper behavior in the cafeteria will be subject to removal.**

**Library**

The library is open every day school is open. The library is open before and after school by appointment. You may use the library during study halls and advisement time. Library sign-in procedures are as follows:

1. You are expected to bring work or read when you sign-in to use the library.
2. For study hall, you may sign-in before school or at the beginning of your study hall block.
3. You must remain in the library after you sign-in for the block.
4. You must be in the library when the bell rings.
5. You must bring materials with you.
6. If you plan to come to the library during advisement, you must get an advisement pass from the library during the day.

**Dance Procedures**

Bolivar-Richburg is very proud of the student body's positive attitude and appropriate conduct at school dances. Dances are considered an extracurricular activity sponsored by the school, and as such, all regulations pertaining to student conduct are in effect.

Middle school dances (grades 6-8) are scheduled from 7:00-9:00 p.m. Grades 9-12 dance times are from 8:00-11:00 p.m. (Special dance times may vary and will be announced in school.). Generally all dances will be held on Friday or Saturday evenings.

Students who leave dances early will not be allowed re-admittance and must sign out when they leave.

In addition, the following rules apply:

- 1) Students must attend school the day of a dance (if a school day).
- 2) If a student leaves a dance, the student must also leave school grounds.
- 3) No one will be admitted during the final hour of either dance.
- 4) Admission is limited to students of Bolivar-Richburg Central School unless they are registered guests. A guest may register as follows:
  - a) Sign up as the host (B-R student) and sign up your guest (one host/one guest).
  - b) Sign up no later than one day prior to the date of the dance. The guest sign-up sheet will be in the main office.
  - c) The host student must accompany his/her guest to the dance in order for the guest to be admitted.
  - d) Any student bringing a guest is responsible for the conduct of the guest.
  - e) The guest must be under the age of twenty-one (21) for all regular dances.

**Guidance**

Guidance services are available for all students. These services include assistance with educational planning, interpretation of test scores, occupational information, career information, study helps, help with home, school and/or social concerns, or any question the student may feel he would like to discuss with the counselor.

Students wishing to visit a counselor should contact the secretary in the guidance office to arrange for an appointment.

**Health Services**

If a student becomes ill in school, the student should report his/her illness to the teacher, who will notify the nurse. The teacher will allow the student to report to the nurse when the nurse is available. The nurse will decide what should be done. Students must not leave the building because of illness without authorization. If the nurse is not in, students are to report to the main office.

**Honor Roll**

The following requirements are in effect for the junior and senior high school honor rolls:

**"High Honor"** roll - students achieving an average of 90% or better in their academic subjects.

**"Honor"** roll - students achieving an average of 85%-90% in their academic subjects.

Students attaining these honor rolls will have their names posted in several display boards in the building as well as printed in the local newspaper. Two Academic Recognition Banquets, grades 6-8 and grades 9-12, will be held in May of each school year. The most outstanding and most improved student in each subject area will receive a framed certificate. Any student who maintains a 95 or above average for the year will receive a "Superintendent's Scholar Certificate", and any student who maintains an average of 90-94 for the year will receive the "Principal's Scholar Certificate". Parents as well as students will be invited to attend these Academic Recognition Banquets.

**Textbooks**

Each pupil will be responsible for his/her textbooks. All textbooks must be covered with a book cover at the beginning of the school year. Students will be required to pay for any lost or damaged textbooks.

**Comprehensive Pupil Attendance. This refers to students in grades 6-12**

\*\*\* Attendance procedures and policies are currently being reviewed by the school administration and Board of Education. Updates and changes will more than likely occur prior to the start of the 2010-2011 school year. All updates and changes will be made available to students and parents upon their completion and adoption.

1. Attendance will be taken daily on a period-to-period basis and reported to the attendance office, Bolivar Main Office (6-12).

2. **Excused Absences, Early Dismissal, and Tardiness** – Pupil will be allowed to make up the classroom assignment in a timely fashion. It is understood that it is not the responsibility of the school or the individual teacher to ensure that missed work is made up. It is the responsibility of the individual student to make up the missed work in a reasonable period of time, which is to be determined by the individual teacher. (Usually within one class day after return to school).

EXCUSED Absences, Tardies & Early Dismissals from school are:

- a. Legal appointments
- b. Educational activities sponsored by the school district
- c. Death of immediate family
- d. Medical illness – personal and/or family member
- e. Music lesson/rehearsal sponsored by the school district.



- f. Medical appointment
- g. Religious holiday
- h. Suspension – In-School Suspension (all students)
- i. Suspension – Out-of-School Suspension (compulsory age students)
- j. Military obligation
- k. Administrative approval/emergency situations – covers unexpected events which keep a student from attendance. The principal will consider such cases individually.
- l. Drivers License Test
- m. Bus late due to conditions beyond student's control
- n. Late with a pass issued by school personnel

**This list is not exhaustive and administrative review will be the final determinate in extenuating circumstances.**

3. **Unexcused Absences, Early Dismissal, and Tardiness** – Student will be allowed to make-up the homework, classroom assignments, quizzes or exams, however a penalty may be imposed by the teacher.

UNEXCUSED Absences, Tardies & Early Dismissals from school are:

- a. Babysitting
- b. Birthday
- c. Extra day before or after vacation
- d. Hunting/fishing
- e. Late with no pass
- f. Non-essential appointments
- g. Senior or any skip day
- h. Suspension – Out-of-school (student older than compulsory age)
- i. Transportation issue
- j. Truancy
- k. Vacation
- l. Overslept
- m. Work obligations



**This list is not exhaustive and administrative review will be the final determinate in extenuating circumstances.**

4. In the event of absenteeism, tardiness, or early dismissals, the following options are available to the administration (or designee):

- a. Phone call
- b. Letters of course attendance
- c. Referral to outside agencies
- d. PINS (Person In Need of Supervision)

5. Attendance will be taken by period in each classroom and reported to the attendance office. In the event of chronic absenteeism, tardiness, or early dismissal, the following options are available to the administration:

- a. Referral to the guidance counselor
- b. Letter sent to the parents concerning the absenteeism, tardiness, or early dismissal,
- c. Home visits made by school personnel
- d. Referral to the school psychologist,
- e. Parents and student requested to meet with the attendance committee. The attendance committee will consist of an administrator, teacher, guidance counselor, school nurse, and school psychologist
- f. Person In Need of Supervision (PINS)
- g. Disciplinary action
- h. Referral to an outside agency
- i. Peer Counseling
- j. Suspension of extracurricular participation.

**This list is not exhaustive and administrative review will be the final determinate in extenuating circumstances.**

#### **OTHER ATTENDANCE PROCEDURES:**

- ✓ Parents are asked to call Bolivar Main Office (6-12) **by 8:30 A.M.** if their child will not be attending school.
- ✓ Please send in a written excuse explaining the reason for their absence upon their return to school.
- ✓ A class cut is an unauthorized absence from class when a student is not absent from school. A cut from a given class will result in administrative action. Chronic problems will result in parent notification, alternative post-school, and loss of privileges.
- ✓ Tardiness to school must be accounted for by a written excuse, signed by a parent or guardian, explaining the reason for the tardiness.

Chronic problems will be handled by the office. Anyone with an unexcused tardy three times in a semester will receive detention for each subsequent tardy. Anyone with an unexcused tardy more than ten times in a semester will receive an extended detention. Any unexcused tardy after 10:00 A.M. will receive an extended detention regardless of the number of times they have been tardy.

- ✓ Teachers are expected to handle tardiness to class to their own satisfaction. Should the problem continue, the administration will be involved for disciplinary action. The action will range from detention to eventual suspension should the tardiness continue.
- ✓ Any parent or guardian requesting the temporary absence of a student (medical appointment, etc., during the day) shall present a written request to the attendance office stating the reason for the absence. Students will be excused from school only in the custody of legal parents or guardians or other such persons designated in writing by the legal parent or guardian.
- ✓ Truancy is an illegal absence without authorization from home or school. Disciplinary action will result in detention or alternative post-school.

### **Bolivar-Richburg Central School** **Section 504 Parent / Student Rights** **in Identification, Evaluation, and Placement**

Please Keep This Explanation for Future Reference  
(Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973)

The following is a description of the rights granted by federal law to students with handicaps.\* The intent of the law is to keep you fully informed concerning decisions about your child and to inform you of your rights if you disagree with any of these decisions.

You have the right to:

1. Have your child take part in, and receive benefits from public education programs without discrimination because of his/her handicapping condition;
2. Have the school district advise you of your rights under federal law;
3. Receive notice with respect to identification, evaluation, or placement of your child;
4. Have your child receive a free appropriate public education. This includes the right to be educated with nonhandicapped students to the maximum extent appropriate. It also includes the right to have the school district make reasonable accommodations to allow your child an equal opportunity to participate in school and school-related activities;
5. Have your child educated in facilities and receive services comparable to those provided nonhandicapped students;
6. Have your child receive special education and related services if he/she is found to be eligible under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act;
7. Have evaluation, educational, and placement decisions made based upon a variety of information sources, and by persons who know the student, the evaluation data, and placement options;
8. Have transportation provided to and from an alternative placement setting at no greater cost to you than would be incurred if the student were placed in a program operated by the district;
9. Have your child be given an equal opportunity to participate in nonacademic and extracurricular activities offered by the district;
10. Examine all relevant records relating to decisions regarding your child's identification, evaluation, educational program, and placement;
11. Obtain copies of educational records at a reasonable cost unless the fee would effectively deny you access to the records;
12. A response from the school district to reasonable requests for explanations and interpretations of your child's records;
13. Request amendment of your child's educational records if there is a reasonable cause to believe that they are inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the privacy rights of your child. If the school district refuses this request for amendment, it shall notify you within a reasonable time, and advise you of the right to a hearing;
14. Request mediation or an impartial due process hearing related to decisions or actions regarding your child's identification, evaluation, educational program, or placement. You and the student may take part in the hearing and have an attorney represent you;
15. Ask for payment of reasonable attorney fees if you are successful on your claim;
16. File a local grievance.

**Food Stamp/TANF/FDPIR Households:** Households which currently include children who receive Food Stamps or Temporary Assistance Needy families (TANF), or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) must complete an application listing the child's name, a food stamp, TANF, or FDPIR case number and the signature of an adult household member, or provide a Direct Certification letter from the NYS Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance. Children in the household with the same case number may be included on the same application. Separate applications are required for children in the same household with different case numbers. If the family does not list a food stamp, TANF, or FDPIR case number for all children for whom they are applying, then the application must contain all the information as required for "other households" as described below.

**Other Households:** Households with incomes the same or below the amount of money listed above for their family size may be eligible for and are urged to apply for free and/or reduced price meals (or free milk). They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home with a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year to Tracie Middleton.

The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used for determining eligibility. The names and eligibility status of participants may also be used for the allocation of funds to federal education programs such as Title I and National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), State health or State education programs, provided the State agency or local education agency administers the programs, and for federal, State or local means-tested nutrition programs with eligibility standards comparable to the NSLP. Eligibility information may also be released to programs authorized under the National School Lunch Act (NSLA) or the Child Nutrition Act (CNA). The release of information to any program or entity not specifically authorized by the NSLA will require a written consent statement from the parent or guardian.

The school district does, however, have the right to verify at any time during the school year the information on the application. If a parent does not give the school this information, the child/children will no longer be able to receive free or reduced price meals (free milk).

Foster children may also be eligible for these benefits. An application for a foster child must contain the child's name, the child's personal use income and an adult signature.

Under the provisions of the policy, the designated official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the designated official, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Jenny Billotta, whose address is 100 School Street, Bolivar, NY 14715, has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy. However, prior to initiating the hearing procedure, the parent or School Food Authority may request a conference to provide an opportunity for the parent and official to discuss the situation, present information, and obtain an explanation of the data submitted in the application or the decisions rendered. The request for a conference shall not in any way prejudice or diminish the right to a fair hearing.

Only complete applications can be approved. This includes complete and accurate information regarding: the Food Stamp, TANF, or FPIR case number; the names of all household members; on an income application the social security number of the person who signs the form or an indication that the adult does not have one, and the amount and source of income received by each household member. In addition, the parent or guardian must sign the application form certifying the information's true and correct.

**ATTENDANCE PROCEDURES K-5**

1. The grades K-5 attendance will be recorded by each teacher using PowerSchool.
2. **Absence:** All students who were absent or tardy from school MUST submit a written excuse upon their return. These excuses are to be sent to the guidance office. Include the child's name and date of absence, the reason for absence or tardiness and parent signature.
3. **Lateness:** When tardy to school, a student must get an Admission Slip upon arrival from the guidance secretary. This slip must be given to his/her teacher.
4. Parents are asked to call the nurse by 8:10 a.m. if their children will not be attending school.
5. **Excused and Unexcused Absences:**

**Absences from school which are considered excused include :**

- Personal illness
- Death in the family
- Medical appointments
- Dental appointments
- Impassable roads
- Weather conditions
- Religious observance
- Required to be in court



- Quarantine
- Music lessons
- Attendance at health clinics
- Educational trip
- Planned evidence of an acceptable educational experience
- Administrative approval / emergency situations – covers unexpected events which keep a student from attendance. Such cases will be considered individually by the principal or his designee.

**Absences from school which are considered unexcused include:**

- Visiting family, friends, etc.
- Hair cut
- Overslept
- Baby-sitting
- Needed at home
- Trip with or without parents – recreational purposes

*Because vacation periods are provided within the school calendar, trips taken at other times during the school year will be considered unexcused absences.*

- Truancy

**For items not contained within the lists of excused and unexcused absences, the principal or his designee will determine if the absence is excused or unexcused.**

**THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT  
BOLIVAR-RICHBURG CENTRAL SCHOOL  
HEALTH POLICIES**

**IMMUNIZATION:** State law requires all students entering public or private school be immunized against the following: polio, DPT, measles, rubella, mumps, chicken pox, hepatitis B and Haemophilus influenza. Legal exemptions are allowed for medical or religious reasons only. A complete record of immunizations must be presented before a child may enter Bolivar-Richburg Central School.

**ILLNESS:** A child who appears ill should be kept home. Prolonged or contagious illness should be reported to the school nurse so she may contact parents whose children may have been exposed. If a child becomes ill in school, parents will be notified and are expected to come for the child or make arrangements to have him/her taken home.

**EMERGENCY NUMBERS:** It is important to have in our files the name and phone number of a friend or relative who may assume responsibility for a child when the parent cannot be reached. Our policy is not to release a child in the custody of anyone other than the parent or a designated person. It is also important to have the name and phone number of the child's doctor.

**EXCUSES:** School policy requires a written excuse be kept on file for each absence or tardy. It should include the child's name, the date, reason for the absence, number of days absent or tardy and the parent's signature.

**EMERGENCY CARE:** State law permits a nurse to give one-time emergency care only. Accidents or illnesses that occur at home cannot be treated at school.

**MEDICATIONS:** A school nurse may not legally give any medication, even aspirin, without a written order signed by a doctor and written permission signed by the parents. Where daily medication is required, the doctor's order and parent's permission must be renewed each year. Never send medications to school with the child. It may change hands on the way to school.

**MEDICAL PROGRAM:** Physicals are required before entrance to kindergarten. School physicals are required in first, third, fifth, seventh and tenth grades and on all new students who have not had one. Parents will be notified of any conditions the doctor feels may require treatment. Eyes and ears of all students, kindergarten through sixth grade, are screened each year. Parents are notified if any student fails the screening test.

**ACCIDENTS:** School related accidents are covered by school insurance. The insurance contract states that parents must use their own insurance first and then the school insurance will continue coverage. This avoids duplication of payments and keeps the cost of the insurance within reasonable limits.



Freezing Saves the Best of Summer

It's August, and that means I'm busily trying to figure out a way to preserve the smells and flavors of my favorite vegetables. I enjoy stocking my freezer with the vegetables I've grown or bought in large quantities from local farmers.

Your freezer is one of the best ways to preserve the color and flavor of summer produce all year long. Here's some great tips for freezing the best selection of your favorite summer vegetables and herbs:

Can I Freeze Bell and Sweet Peppers Raw?

If you've picked a peck of peppers and have too many to eat, try freezing them. Peppers are one of those foods that can be quickly frozen raw without blanching them first. The National Center for Home Food Preservation, hosted by the University of Georgia Cooperative Extension Service, offers these guidelines on freezing bell and sweet peppers raw:

Select crisp, tender, green or bright-red pods. Wash, cut out stems, cut in half and remove seeds. If desired, cut into 1/2-inch strips or rings. Good for use in uncooked foods because they have a crisper texture, or in cooked foods. Package raw, leaving no headspace. Seal and freeze.

NOTE: To make it easier to remove only the amount of frozen bell or sweet peppers needed at one time, freeze sliced or diced peppers in a single layer on a cookie sheet with sides. Transfer to a "freezer" bag when frozen, excluding as much air as possible from the bag.

Can Tomatoes be Frozen Raw?

Like peppers, tomatoes can be frozen raw. Frozen tomatoes are best used in cooked foods such as soups, sauces and stews as they become mushy when they're thawed.

Select firm, ripe tomatoes with deep red color. Wash and dip in boiling water for 30 seconds to loosen skins. Core and peel. Freeze whole or in pieces. Pack into containers, leaving 1-inch headspace. Seal and freeze.

TIP: Dip just a few tomatoes at a time into the boiling water or the water temperature may be lowered too much to remove the skins without overheating the tomatoes. Place hot tomatoes in a colander and rinse under cold water to make them easier to handle. A knife with a serrated edge works best for cutting tomatoes.

How About Freezing Fresh Herbs?

Wash, drain and pat the herbs dry with paper towels. Wrap a few sprigs or leaves in freezer wrap and place in a freezer bag, then seal and freeze. The frozen herbs can be chopped and used in cooked dishes. After freezing, the herbs usually are not suitable for garnish, as they become limp when thawed.

TIP: To extend the time frozen fruits and vegetables maintain good quality, package foods in material intended for freezing and keep the temperature of the freezer



Studies show that when schools adopt green cleaning practices, children's exposure to harmful cleaning chemicals and substances is reduced. Green cleaning, when practiced by more and more school and government facilities will also make a significant difference for the environment. f

Roof Brackets Make Repair Jobs Safer

Q: When you write about fixing gutters or stuff on the roof, you always say to secure yourself with a rope so you don't fall. But where exactly is a person supposed to secure the rope? -- Dale J., Dothan, Ala.

A: Many home repair guides will tell you to secure the rope to a sturdy feature -- like the chimney. I'm not too comfortable with telling people to tie a rope around their chimney, because they're not always as sturdy and secure as one might think. A chimney that's crumbling or leaning is definitely unsafe (in a lot of ways, not the least of which is to the roof worker).

For a roof with a low pitch (an angle that's not too steep), roof brackets can be installed during repair work. These are slipped underneath shingles, about a foot and a half up the roof eave, and nailed directly into a rafter (so they are anchored securely). Multiple brackets are spaced about 4 feet apart.

During the job, your safety rope (or ideally, a roof safety harness) is attached to a bracket. The rope itself should not be so long that you can't pull yourself back onto the roof or over to the ladder should you slip off the edge. Once the job is finished, the brackets are removed and the shingles cemented back down.

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Again, the brackets work most effectively on low-pitch roofs. If your home's roof is very steep, or if the roof is several stories up, don't attempt roof repairs yourself. Contact a professional roofer to handle the job -- he'll have the tools, the helpers and the safety equipment to match what your roof requires.

HOME TIP: Tape a flashlight to the wall or floor joist near the entrance to the attic, so it will immediately be available for you to use when checking dark corners.

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
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## Don't Bumble Toasting The Couple

One of the most daunting tasks after the wedding ceremony is the series of toasts to the new couple. Parents and friends may take the floor but the duty generally falls on the best man and maid of honor. Relaxed and enjoying the celebration, many attendants begin to sweat as they are caught unawares by the signal that it is time to stand and deliver. A little preparation and forethought can make the difference between an embarrassing, stumbling attempt and a memorable moment for the happy couple of which the orator can be proud.

For anyone attempting to speak at the reception, often the most difficult part is how to begin the toast. Humor is always enjoyable, but difficult to execute, sweet sentimentality always draws the appreciative murmurs and dewy thanks but can sound phony. The KISS (Keep It Short & Simple) approach is a reliable method, always leave them wanting more, rather than responding with a snore!

Lifting poignant lines

(with proper attribution, of course) from the famous, brilliant and/or "just happens to be appropriate for this couple" creates a nice platform or wrap up for the speech. 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of the ceremony. She is one of the two witnesses who sign the marriage certificate. She usually helps the bride dress for the wedding, and sees to it that the bridesmaids are dressed and ready on time. She is the bride's lady-in-waiting in all details.

When it is time for the newlyweds to leave the reception to dress for going away, the maid of honor helps the bride change, sees that the luggage is delivered to the best man, and checks on any last-minute details.

The groom usually chooses as his best man his brother, a cousin or a close friend. In some cases, the best man may be the groom's father or favorite uncle.

The best man attends the rehearsal and briefs ushers on special seating arrangements for wedding guests. On the day of the wedding, he takes charge of the wedding ring for the bride. If a ring bearer is used, the best man helps him with his duties at the altar.

The best man helps the groom pack and dress for the wedding, then accompanies him to the church a half-hour before the ceremony is to take place, remaining in the vestry until the wedding march begins. He checks on the marriage license

and sees that the groom has it with him before he leaves for the church. He secures the clergyman's fee from the groom and gives it to the minister.

He is the first to toast the bride and groom at the reception. He has the groom's car ready at the right moment and after assists the couple in a safe getaway.
